





"A Peaceful Bridge Between the Cultures Through the Olympics"

Is a multilateral partnership cross-curricular project that involves four schools. The aim is to enable teachers and students to work together with our partners.

The associated schools are working on a common project called "Olympeace". The project will give us the chance to exchange experiences and improve students' and teachers' competence not only on the issue of the topic but also in understanding the meaning of values associated with European citizenship.

This project is a unique opportunity for the students involved to meet their peers from the other countries, to know other cultures and to improve their knowledge and use of foreign languages; enhancing motivation to learn.

The results that will arise are: presentations (PPT), e-albums with photos, Mini Olympic competitions in each participating country, an interview with an athlete, short videos of meetings, a common brochure, T-shirts with the project's logo, a website for the project, a calendar and the organization of rules for the Mini Olympic Competitions.

The teaching methods that will be used are: presentation, individual and group work, online communication between students and teachers, sports-competitions and cultural & social activities.

This project is a unique opportunity for the students involved to meet with their peers from the other countries and to know other cultures. The students will be involved in each part of the project.

The students will research about the Olympics (aims, process, areas of sports etc.) and Olympic philosophy by using ICT technology, study and present the collected information. Additionally, they will research peace, war, friendship, brotherhood, values, tolerance, patience, empathy, and cultural differences, individual differences, misperception concepts and the evils of the war.

Olympeace in Pescara

It is the capital city of the Province of Pescara, in the Abruzzo region of Italy. In January 2007 it was the most populated city within Abruzzo at 123,059 residents, approximately 450,000 including the surrounding metropolitan area. Located on the Adriatic coast at the mouth of the Aterno-Pescara River, the present day municipality was formed in 1927 joining the municipalities of Pescara, the part of the city to the south of the river, and Castellamare Adriatico, the part of the city to the north of the river.

The surrounding area was formed into the province of Pescara. The poet Gabriele D'Annunzio, a native of Pescara, was a major sponsor for the creation of the new city. The main commercial street of the city is Corso Umberto I, which runs from Piazza della Republica and reaches the seacoast at Piazza Primo Maggio. The rectangle that it forms with Corso Vittorio Emanuele II and Via Nicola Fabrizi encloses the main shopping district, where several of the best fashion shops are located.

Corso Manthonè, the course of the old Pescara has, for many years, been the center of the nightlife of the city. City hall and the administration of the province are in Piazza Italia, near the river, and in the area between here and the faculties of Economics, Architecture, Foreign Languages and Literature of G. d'Annunzio University to the south, a business district has grown up over the years.

Values of Sport

Through history, the games people play have helped us to understand their core values.

The Olympic Games evolved out of the ancient Greeks' appreciation for the beauty of form and the human body. The blood sport of the Romans was a natural outgrowth of a society based on conquest. Native Americans loved contests that emphasized speed and the accuracy of their weapons, because their whole existence depended on those skills.

Which brings me to this: What will future generations think of us if they look to our sports? Basketball players brawling with fans, a college football player photographed kicking an opponent in the head on the side-lines, all this against a continuous background of millionaire players whining about money and drug testing.

We have spent a lot of time this year talking about values, but isn't it time to talk about what has happened to our sports? Too often, from the Little League level up, we have put so much emphasis on winning that we've come to accept, even encourage, the more boorish behaviour by athletes as long as they win.

The great value of sport is that it teaches us to recognize the difference between winning and striving for excellence, the better but much harder achievement. More important, sport teaches us how to handle failure, to get up and try again when we lose. That's the most valuable lesson, since we lose more than we win in life.

Somehow those lessons have been lost in modern sports. If we are blind to that and do nothing about it, then the core values which have been the strength of this country are changing. We cannot let that happen.

Olympeace in Ankara

It is the capital of Turkey, located in Central Anatolia. With a population of 4,587,558 in the urban center (2014) and 5,150,072 in its province (2015), it is Turkey's second largest city behind Istanbul.

Ankara was Atatürk's headquarters from 1920 and has been the capital of the Republic of Turkey since its founding in 1923. The government is a prominent employer but Ankara is also an important commercial and industrial city, located at the center of Turkey's road and railway networks. The city gave its name to the Angora wool shorn from Angora rabbits, the long-haired Angora goat (the source of mohair), and the Angora cat. The area is also known for its pears, honey, and muscat grapes. Although situated in one of the driest places of Turkey and surrounded mostly by steppe vegetation except for the forested areas on the southern periphery, Ankara can be considered a green city in terms of green areas per inhabitant, which is 72 m² per head.

Ankara is a very old city with various Hittite, Phrygian, Hellenistic, Roman, Byzantine, and Ottoman archaeological sites. The historical center of town is a rocky hill rising 150 m (500 ft) over the left bank of the Ankara Çayı, a tributary of the Sakarya River, the classical Sangarius. The hill remains crowned by the ruins of the old citadel. Although few of its outworks have survived, there are well-preserved examples of Roman and Ottoman architecture throughout the city, the most remarkable being the 20 bc Temple of Augustus and Rome that boasts the Monumentum Ancyranum, the inscription recording the Res Gestae Divi Augusti
